


CARING AMID A PANDEMIC

We would like to thank all of the individuals and businesses who

NEW IN 2020

The Ben Snapp Memorial Fund was created in 2020 with a one-time gift from Mary, Charlie, and Breanne Snapp. It was given in memory of their son and brother, Ben. This memorial fund offers help to individuals who are facing barriers to opioid abuse treatment and recovery services.



Financial assistance is provided to patients who may lack insurance, or who are unable to afford the cost of medication. The fund is administrated by the foundation, and falls under the direction of Dr. Angela Gatzke-Plamann, who provides care for individuals with substance use disorders.

BP KITS AT LOCAL LIBRARIES

High blood pressure (BP), also known as hypertension, is a common medical condition that impacts men and women of all ages. Self-monitoring BP for an extended period of time at home has proven effective in helping patients control their BP. Unfortunately, not everyone can afford to purchase a BP cuff for personal use.

With the support of local Lions Clubs, the foundation and local libraries have made BP monitoring kits available for checkout to area residents. These kits include a BP monitor/cuff, instructions, educational material about BP, and a BP tracking journal. Kits can be checked out for two weeks at a time from libraries in Mauston, New Lisbon, Necedah, Kendall, Wonewoc, and Elroy.

EQUIPMENT PURCHASES

Lucas 3 Chest Compression System

Awarded Department: Emergency

This piece of equipment provides automatic, safe and effective chest compressions for CPR. During an event, it also reduces stress on the medical team and reduces the risk of injury to the staff and the patient.



Beckman Coulter Aution Eleven

Awarded Department: Lab

This urine analyzer will provide reliable urinalysis testing when the main instrument is not available.

Perfusion Software

Awarded Department: Imaging

The use of CT Perfusion Imaging has recently become the standard of care in assessment of emergent stroke patients. Perfusion Imaging "unlocks" the extended time frame for stroke therapy. It helps identify patients who would benefit from endovascular therapy at a tertiary facility.

These new carts are especially important during COVID to meet isolation PPE containment. The carts also increase staff efficiency when responding to an emergency.

When a new resident is admitted to the nursing home, this scale allows the resident's weight to be taken in the admission room. It will allow for some peace and privacy while acclimating to a new environment.



Infant Airway Management Trainer

The trainer provides a realistic tool for practicing the specialized skills required for infant airway management.

Leg Wrapping Support System

\$628

This positioning device elevates and comfortably supports a patient's leg during wound care.

Used during life support and other training classes, this interactive infant manikin is used to teach hands-on infant resuscitation.
